CAA Saskatchewan Announces Top Ten Worst Roads

The 2015 CAA Saskatchewan Worst Roads campaign is over, and the results are in. A total of 4,556 votes were tabulated during this year's campaign which started March 25th and ended April 17, 2015. The top ten worst roads are:

1. Saskatchewan 354, Dilke
2. Saskatchewan 4, Val Marie
3. Saskatchewan 322, Silton
4. Saskatchewan 36, Coronach
5. Saskatchewan 220, Bulyea
6. Saskatchewan 43, Gravelbourg
7. Saskatchewan 47, Springside
8. Saskatchewan 27, Vonda
9. Saskatchewan 18, Fife Lake
10. Saskatchewan 155, La Loche

"This year's campaign captured a lot of interest from motorists including CAA Members, with representation of roads and highways from all around the province," said Christine Niemczyk, Director of Corporate Communications & Public Relations. Over 260 roads and highways, including residential streets were nominated in this year's campaign. A road qualifies as a "worst" if it is in general disrepair with potholes, cracks, has poor signage or congestion or is too narrow for motorists, pedestrians and cyclists to share safely. CAA Saskatchewan's Top Ten Worst Roads in the 2015 Campaign will be shared with the appropriate government groups. The total number of votes in the 2014 campaign was 4,651, with 2,800 votes in the 2013 campaign and 2,900 votes received in the 2012 campaign.

The CAA Worst Roads campaign helps put a spotlight on troublesome and even dangerous road conditions in the province and is one tool to help address those roads in most need of attention. Working towards better roads and driving safety is a priority for CAA Saskatchewan.
